
Roland P. Falkner

Roland Post Falkner (born 14 April 1866 in <u>Bridgeport, Connecticut</u>; died 27 November 1940 in <u>New York City</u>) was a <u>United States economist</u> and <u>statistician</u>. [1]

Biography

He graduated from the <u>University of Pennsylvania</u> (Wharton School of Finance and Economy) in 1885; studied economics at <u>Berlin</u>, <u>Leipzig</u> and <u>Halle-on-Saale</u>, Germany; studied at the <u>Collège de France</u>; was instructor in accounting and statistics in the University of Pennsylvania in 1888-91, and professor of statistics 1891-1900. He served also as statistician of the <u>United States Senate</u> Committee of Finance in 1891; as secretary of the United States delegation to the <u>International Monetary Conference</u>; and as secretary of the conference in 1892. He left the University of Pennsylvania in 1900 for the <u>Library of Congress</u>, where he was chief of the division of documents. From 1904 to 1907 he served as commissioner of education in <u>Puerto Rico</u>; from 1908 to 1911 he was statistician in charge of school inquiries for the <u>United States Immigration Commission</u>, and in 1911-12 was assistant director of the <u>census</u>. From 1915 until 1926 he was associated with the <u>Alexander Hamilton Institute</u>, and from 1926 onward with the <u>National Industrial Conference Board</u>.

In 1894 he was elected to the International Institute of Statistics. [1] In 1920 he was elected as a Fellow of the American Statistical Association. [3]

Works



He is author of numerous essays on criminology, sociology, etc. to economic, statistical and other journals; and was editor of *Annals* of the <u>American Academy of Political and Social Science</u> 1890-1900. [2] He did a notable study of prices and wages in the United States for the <u>United States Senate</u>. It was published as "Retail Prices and Wages" (1892) and "Wholesale Prices, Wages, and Transportation" (1893). [4][1] He published a translation of <u>August Meitzen</u>'s *History, Theory, and Technique of Statistics* (1893). [5][2]
